## **ECHO**Walking Festival

Two groups of people recently took the opportunity to walk along the conveyor from the Martha open pit to Union Hill, before exploring the historic foundations on the hill and ending up at the Tunnellers' Memorial at Gilmour Reserve. The conveyor belt section of the walk is made possible because the conveyor is not operating while there is no mining in the open pit. Promoted as a 'walk through present and past', the guides explain modern mining, some of the history of the area, and the story of the Waihi tunnellers in World War One.

That meant the unit was no longer available to the public. We have addressed that issue by recently donating a new defib unit to the Waihi Rugby Club. There is also a unit available during office hours at our Admin. Office at 43 Moresby Avenue, and another at the Gold Discovery Centre. ## FIREFIGHTER Sky Tower Stair Challenge
