A different kind of long drop

The new portal in the Martha open pit has a refuge unit next to it on the pit floor. This unit is designed to be used in emergencies and has been constructed out of a 40 foot container that was left in the pit after the 2016 slip. Recently members of the OceanaGold Waihi Mines Rescue Team abseiled into the pit to take a fibre optic cable from the surface down to the refuge unit. This cable will be used to provide communications to the container. The 200-metre abseil is relatively easy. Climbing up a 200-metre rope is a little more demanding.

Kauri Gold staff visited the Waihi Arts Centre and Museum recently, but didn't even go inside.



Their attention was on the berdan pans on display in front of the museum. Over the years the timber frame holding the heavy pans had deteriorated and become dangerous.

"creative thinking and several bottle iacks...

OceanaGold was approached for assistance. We got Kauri Gold involved. A plan was developed to replace the supporting timbers one at a time. This avoided the need for a crane, and instead involved a lot of creative thinking and several bottle jacks. Berdan pans are circular grinding pans which were used to crush rock to a fine powder before mercury was added to extract gold. They had one large iron ball which ground the rock as the pan rotated. In this respect they are an early and very simple example of a ball mill, similar to the one we use today to grind ore.

MINERS REUNION tomorrow

Each year for the last two decades we have hosted a gathering of miners who worked on site prior to 1952. In the early days we needed three buses, and they were full. With the passing of the years we are now reduced to one small bus. Tomorrow the early miners will tour the site before travelling on the Goldfields Railway train to Waikino for lunch.
